

This summer, one of our book groups is reading The Great Spiritual Migration: How the World's Largest Religion is Seeking a Better Way to be Christian by Brian McLaren. It's been a good read so far, inviting us into thinking differently about what Christianity is and should be. I thought, over the course of the summer, I might give you a little taste of what McLaren brings up and what I think.

Why? Because, as I said on Pentecost, the Church needs to change. That's big "C" church – not Good Shepherd itself, but the whole of Christianity is in need of reformation. Not just the ELCA, the denomination that we belong to, not just a couple of denominations in the United States, but all of those who claim to be followers of Jesus. And we, as a part of the whole, should be open to the winds of the Spirit as we walk in new ways, too.

I happen to think that Brian's book is incredibly compassionate to the church and to the ways that it needs to change. It is clear that he has a heart and love for the community of believers that is trying to follow Jesus even as he challenges our tendencies to cling to maybe not the wrong things, but not the main things.

In the first part of the book, Brian wrestles with the truth: that the main thing is not belief. The main thing is not getting the right doctrines (statements about God) or right theology (beliefs about God, the world, humans, the Bible, etc). The main thing isn't church structures or spiritual authority. The main thing isn't saying the right words or completing a checklist of "sacraments." The main thing, Brian reminds us, is love. "Though I speak in the tongues of men and or angels, but have not love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging symbol." Brian quotes from 1 Corinthians 13. Or there's always Jesus, "This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you." Brian actually quotes all of these wrong, substituting "right doctrines" and "right theory of atonement" for "love" to make a point how easy it is for us to miss the main point there. He writes, "In spite of the fact that no such statements can be found in the Scriptures, you can take this to the bank: when it comes to Christianity in many of its forms, have the right beliefs and you are in. Orthodox. Certified. Bona fide. Legit. But important as beliefs are, they are not the essential, unchanging, defining feature of Christianity."

This is perhaps a bit hard for us to wrap our heads around. Us, who week in and week out recite the creeds together and are taught all this theology stuff in Confirmation class. Us, who, worry about if we believe enough or the right things. Christianity is not so much about belief. But about love. Loving God as God has loved us. Loving neighbor as ourselves.

And commitment to that love should hold a deeper loyalty to us than any of our beliefs. Brian shares his experience of choosing to love and truly accept a gay friend over his denomination's theological conviction that LGBTQIA+ people are somehow sinful for their love, gender, or sexuality. I'm grateful to be a part of a denomination that does not believe such things but understands all people to be made in the image of God. And we understand that love comes from God and is a holy gift of God.

I appreciate, though, Brian's wrestling with his struggles around this and how he reminds us that such struggles and honest shifts in understanding make us more credible as people of faith because we are corrigible. Corrigible meaning that we can learn and change. Being willing to learn and change because of the experiences of our neighbors—especially those different from us—is one way that we show real love. And such love is life-giving and attractive. Such loving isn't a system of beliefs that we can ascent to on Sunday and then go about our lives unchanged, either.

That, I think, the main point that Brian would like to get to. Christianity isn't just a system of beliefs. It's a way of life. A way of living so that our faith in a loving, living God changes the way we are in the world. Brian writes, "If Christian faith can be redefined in this way, if our prime contribution to humanity can be shifted from teaching correct beliefs to practicing the way of love as Jesus taught, then our whole understanding and experience of the church could be transformed. That's why I'd like us to take a fresh look at the church as a school of love."

This captures my imagination for where the Spirit might be calling us as a community of faith. What does Good Shepherd look like as a school of love? How are we already such a thing? What new things might we do or stillness's might we keep (sometimes not doing is important to hear the Spirit, too) to become more of a school of love for each of us and for the community around us?

Interesting things to ponder this summer. I'd love to hear your thoughts!




